

## **Feedback from Participants in the Third International Cultural Political Economy Conference/Workshop 6-8 September 2017**

"Thanks a lot for a fantastic couple of days! The welcoming and inclusionary atmosphere has been amazing, and it has been such a wonderful experience participating in both the workshop and conference. For the next conference, doing this sort of introductory workshop again would be great.

Just a couple of thoughts on potential path-ways for next time:

One way of supplementing the one-day workshop might be to make smaller "workshops for young/early-stage scholars" throughout the conference days (1-2 hour sessions). These could focus on different sub-themes, such as 'How to integrate different selectivities within empirical case studies?', 'How to navigate Scylla and Charybdis?', 'How to write-up CPE studies?', 'How to be a CPE scholar within the neoliberal university?' and so forth. While these could be organized as more formal presentations, they could also take the form of more open dialogical spaces throughout the days.

Another road might be to try some kind of informal mentoring scheme, where "senior" and "junior" researchers volunteer to have one (or more) informal talks about their research during the conference days. I think this is something that is being done at a number of other conferences and it might also have some potential here.
