The Carnegie Trust grants are only available to applicants in Scottish HEIs, but their scheme has been selected because while the form requires applicants to think carefully about most of the standard elements of a grant application, it doesn't ask for information on impact. Impact is being addressed in a separate workshop at the LitSciMed event, and it makes the job of assessing the research projects easier if impact is set to one side.

Please devise a project for which you would like to apply for funding (bearing in mind the maximum and minimum levels of award under this grant scheme). It should be something that really is on your current or near-future research agenda. Ignore questions of your own eligibility to apply for this scheme, and fill in the form as if it were a real application. Ignore the section on Institutional Approval, but please complete the Budget section. Please send the completed application to alice.jenkins@gla.ac.uk by 21 March. Alice will assume that you're willing for her to share with the group anything you include on the form. During the session, examples from the completed forms will be used to inform the discussion of tactics for successful grant capture and ways of building on that success.
