



Progression to Postgraduate Study at LU: 4. SHAPE Questions for reflection

PPS:LU is exploring the progression to postgraduate study at Lancaster University. It focuses on three groups of students namely: disabled students; students from a minority ethnic group; and students from a disadvantaged socio-economic background (e.g. low-income households). As part of the project, we are producing practical resources for staff and students which are informed by our research findings. This paper is for students to use to aid thinking and planning for progression.

SHAPE: A progression pentagon

This briefing paper is for students, primarily undergraduate and Masters students, to use as a resource. It is organised around the acronym 'SHAPE' which stands for Support, Helpers, Actions, Planners, Experience. Each step or point in the progression pentagon is described followed by questions to facilitate thinking and planning. You may use these questions for individual reflection or as part of a group discussion where experiences and resources can be shared.

We have rearranged the steps in 'SHAPE' into their usual order but recognise the 'steps' may be visited several times and not necessarily in the order we suggest here. For example, you may work on a research project for your course (experience) which prompts you to explore PG study in greater depth (planners).

1. Planners: How much do you know about further study?

We found students may not consider postgraduate study as 'something for them'. Not because they had explored the options and reached an informed decision. But because of other things, such as a lack of confidence, viewing PG study as for 'other people, not like them' or because they think PG study is like UG study. This is why we are asking you to reflect on what you know **before** you decide.

Studying at postgraduate level is different to undergraduate, how it differs will depend on the discipline but in general there is greater specialisation in a particular subject with more independent study. If you are curious about something and you want to learn more, further study could be for you. Below are some questions you may want to ask and find out the answers: **Do you know:**

- a. What skills you'd develop and how these might help you gain work in your chosen field?
- b. The difference between a Masters and a Doctorate?
- c. What courses you could do after your undergraduate degree, here at LU or elsewhere?

There is lots of information available but it can be overwhelming, and you may not know where to begin.

If you are unsure, perhaps start with looking at <u>Prospects.ac.uk</u> which provides an overview of what Masters degrees and Doctorates are, or attend an <u>Open Day</u> event at LU or elsewhere.

2. Helpers: who might lend a hand?

Don't know where to start in thinking about PG study, let alone know what questions to ask? You are not alone, this is normal! It is a cliché, but it is true: there is no such thing as a silly question, apart from one that doesn't get asked. Often, we'll wait for someone else to ask, and if they do, other people breathe a sigh of relief and 'own up' that they didn't know either. Here are some suggestions regarding who might help...

- a. Talk to a lecturer, tutor, or your academic advisor about the options.
- b. Make an appointment with a Careers Advisor.
- Ask a friend or peer if they know anyone who it may be helpful for you to talk to.
- d. Is there a space where you meet current postgraduates? Ask them about their journey and experience.

3. Support: Is PG study practically possible?

If you've now had a look around and think PG study could be something for you, what next? One important step is to explore whether it is possible for you.

- 1. Is it affordable? Find out what funding is available, and how and when to apply.
- 2. What are the course entry requirements?
- 3. How would the course fit with other commitments you have?
- 4. If you want to continue but not straightaway, find out who can help you to return to study.

Answering these questions might need some digging, but there are people and resources out there to help. See the Helpers and Planners sections for suggestions.

4. Experience: can you get some?

From talking to students and staff we found that **experiencing** research can help in deciding about postgraduate study. PG study is very different from UG and often the best way of learning about the differences is to get a taste. Experience may also be crucial in making an application more competitive. Opportunities to gain experience vary across disciplines but here are some questions to consider:

- a. Can you do a dissertation or research project as part of your current course?
- b. Can you do a research internship, here at LU or elsewhere? If it isn't paid, is there help with expenses?
- c. Is there any casual part-time employment as a research assistant available?
- d. Could you attend departmental seminars to learn more about the research being done in your field?
- e. What about placement experience, for example, in a research laboratory?

5. Actions

- a. Set aside some time to do some thinking and exploring.
- b. Write a list of some people who you will ask about PG study.
- c. Explore resources such as the website Prospects.ac.uk and attend an Open Day event.
- d. Get some research experience: always good to have whatever you decide.
- e. If you decide you'd like to go further, make it a priority to check deadlines for things like funding applications.

We cannot emphasise this enough: Don't miss out by not finding out.


