
Making the Business Case for Anaerobic Digestion in Africa

Grace Bridgewater from the Lancaster Environment Centre and Cathy Olphin from Lancaster University Management School summarise the key outcomes of their analysis of business models for anaerobic digestion across Africa, showcasing case studies from Kenya, South Africa, Botswana and Ghana.



A recipe for success

Andrew Amenaghawon and Newton Ihoeghian from the University of Benin share some outcomes of their research on optimising the Anaerobic Digestion process, by establishing the best ratio for combining cattle rumen content (CRC) and food waste (FW) during batch anaerobic co-digestion.
