

Dear Allison,




Dear Oscar,

I am writing to send you kind regards from the course space of Lancaster University, as I come to the end of my practice theory course, it was quite an intensive time.


Throughout this course, I have learned a lot about various approaches to understanding practices, social order, agency and the capacities of individuals interconnecting in complexes of practices.


Moreover, I have gained a range of new didactical ideas for conceptualizing my teaching using funny creative methods.




Dear doctoral thesis supervisor,

Tt was a very intense but also inspiring week.






