How do we build caring, critical, and decolonial epistemologies in migration and refugee research? What vocabularies enable us to understand refugee and migrant worlds from *within*?

Today, over 300 million people live outside their country of origin, with more than 130 million forcibly displaced by war, conflict, and persecution (UNHCR, 2026). Yet mainstream media (Alhayek, 2014) and academic narratives (Espiritu and Duong, 2018) often reduce these individuals to passive victims or economic commodities- expected to ‘adapt’ or ‘integrate’ rather than being recognised as human beings with their own honour, dignity, and forms of life. Structural, integration-focused research perpetuates this misrecognition, foreclosing the very vocabularies, relationships, and moral worlds within which their sense of self is constituted. At a time of intensifying anti-migration and anti-refugee policies and discourses, the importance of caring and critical knowledge production could not be overstated. This workshop asks how we might develop dignifying epistemologies and methodologies that understand refugee and migrant life within its own ‘grammar of language’ (Mahmood, 2005) — one attentive to the embodied, relational, and ethical worlds through which their agency and dignity must be understood.

In this critical development session, we draw on critical refugee and migrant epistemologies, in which joy, refusal, liveability, dignity, honour, and ingratitude are understood as “deliberate and wilful moves to imagine and enact new subjectivities, new ways of being, and new freedoms that lie just outside the humanitarian refugee regime” (Espiritu et al., 2022: 96). This requires us to foreground the experiences of those whose lived realities are too often overlooked and to attune ourselves, as researchers, to the diverse vocabularies within which their voices, silences, feelings, and forms of life are situated.

This workshop brings together scholars across refugee and migration studies to collectively imagine what critical and dignifying migration epistemologies in management thought might look like. Our network, RAMnet, is a new initiative dedicated to establishing refugee and migrant studies as a recognised field: one that refuses to flatten displaced lives into policy problems or integration metrics, and insists on foregrounding the agency, resistance, dignity, silences, voices, and emotions of people who move, or are compelled to move. At a time when the humanity of refugees, migrants, and displaced communities is routinely diminished in politics and the media, building a scholarship that honours mobile populations is both urgent and necessary. This is a space to build community, share the challenges and possibilities of critical refugee and migration research, and advance an intellectual project grounded in care, community and collectivity.

Workshop Structure

The 90-minute workshop opens with an introduction to RAMnet and a short provocation from the convenors: what does it mean to produce knowledge with, rather than about, refugees, migrants, and other mobile communities, and what does that demand of us as researchers?

This is followed by brief presentations from RAMnet members sharing work in progress, including reflections on methodology, positionality, and the ethical challenges of refugee and migration research in management thought.

The remainder of the session is structured around two rounds of small-group discussion:

Round One — Critical Refugee and Migrant Epistemologies: How do we build epistemologies that honour the grammar, dignity, agency, and aspirations of refugees, migrants, and displaced communities? How might we collectively imagine and create caring epistemologies?

Round Two — Caring Methodologies: What methodologies allow us to access the silences, emotions, and everyday worlds of refugees and migrants? How can we develop creative, critical, and decolonial methodologies to study with displaced populations?

The session closes with a collective reflection and an open invitation to join and shape RAMnet as a growing intellectual home for critical refugee and migration studies in management thought.

The session offers a supportive, voluntary space for reflection, sharing lived experiences, personal stories, coping strategies, and collective visions for moving forward. The aim is to cultivate a community of care and curiosity in which migration and displacement are understood not only as crises “out there”, but as questions that demand our collective scholarly attention, ethical responsibility, and commitment to shaping the field with care.

10 mins	Reflection and way forward	Expanding RAMnet and building a refugee and migration research community
